JULY 2015 REPORT

Community Support

- All Town residents can now apply for and receive their State of Washington Concealed Pistol License through the Eatonville Police Department. If interested, contact Gaille at the Police Department on Tuesdays and Wednesdays between 9:00 am and 4:00 pm. For full details and costs, please refer to the Town of Eatonville website or Facebook page for the two page fact sheet.
 - Please refer to the calls for service summary for number issued.
- Vacation checks can be requested by contacting Gaille or any officer and filling out the request form. With summer vacations being planned, please add this to your pre-vacation “to do” list so we can help check your house while you are gone.
- The June 27th Rod Knocker’s Car Show, the Wine Walk and the Street Dance were all a success, with no notable incidents.
- The July 3 Fireworks show and July 4 Parade were both a success, with no notable incidents. We had one lost child during the Fireworks Show, but she was quickly reunited with her parents.
 - Eatonville Police received no cost support from the Pierce County Sheriff’s Department for both events, as the regional events are attended by Town and County residents.
 - Fireworks show: Two detachment deputies worked the infield, paid as off duty work by private Firework’s Committee. I worked unified command with Fire Chief, while EPD Officer Wade and McGuire worked Town issues and off site traffic control.
 - Parade: One detachment deputy worked a traffic control point, as four traffic control points are needed for safe operations. EPD Officer Wade, McGuire and I worked the other three.

Public Safety Committee Requests

- The Public Safety Committee is reviewing the following E.P.D. requests;
 - Physical speed reduction measures {EPD driven}:
 - Should speed reduction measures {speed bumps or humps} be placed adjacent to the Skate Park, Playground and Recycle Center area to physically slow vehicle traffic 24/7?
 - Our hope is the physical speed reduction measures in this area will create a safer recreational play area for our residents. This road is commonly used by vehicles to bypass the downtown area and the 4 way stop intersection.
 - Pending...
 - Residential speed limits {EPD driven}:
 - Current E.M.C. has reduced the speed limit in most of our residential areas to 15mph. State law places the speed limit in all incorporated towns and cities at 25mph, unless posted otherwise.
 - In order to enforce the speed zones at lower than 25mph, there needs to be two things; statutory authority and the lower speed limit signs must be posted to alert the citizens of the change. The E.M.C. has been changed, but no mandatory signs have been posted.
 - The question to the Public Safety Committee – Does the Council want to keep the speed limits at 15mph {mandatory signage needed}, or reset the statutory speed limits to 25mph, aligning with state speed limits {E.M.C. needs to be changed}?
 - Currently, the only speed limit that we can legally enforce is 25mph
 - All Terrain Vehicles on Public Roadways {Mr. Donnie Stewart request at Council Meeting}:
 - Can properly equipped All Terrain Vehicles be allowed to operate on the public roadways of the Town of Eatonville?
 - Washington has changed the state laws to allow properly equipped and licensed ATVs to operate on public roadways outside of incorporated Towns and Cities.
 - Decision Point: Change the E.M.C. to bring our statute into alignment with state law, allowing it...or; not change the E.M.C. or allow our residents to operate their properly equipped ATVs on the Town's roadways?
 - Reviewed at Public Safety Committee on June 2, 2015. Pending...

Upcoming Events

- October 17: We are currently working with the Town Manager and coordinator of the Salmon Festival for the public safety requirements to support this event.

Performance Plan

- The Performance Plan is a Problem Oriented tool that is used by departments to address quality of life issues within their communities.
 - Emphasis of the Month
 - During July, our continued focus will be crime prevention patrols and pedestrian safety.
 - We continue to monitor the Bud Blanchard Trail system and develop strategy to manage new issues and patrol it effectively and efficiently. We have seen the trail system develop into a very positive destination location for the Town.
 - We have had two car prowls at the trail head over the past month, with items of value taken from cars {15-165-0379 & 15-184-1002}.
 - We have increased our patrol checks of the trailhead and trail to deter and detect this behavior. No discernable pattern to date.
 - Pierce County 911 Service Contract
 - The contract has continued to work well. Through this contract, the department has been able to lower overtime costs while maintaining service.
 - For number of calls billed, please refer to the calls for service summary of this report.
 - This contract has helped my department manage the officer's requested time off, both sick leave and vacations. Ensures employees can take earned time off without impacting the community's needs (minimizes overtime spending during surge periods).
 - We will see an increase in billed calls for service for June and July, as one of our officers is out on extended sick leave and we are not backfilling the shifts with overtime, but allowing the calls to be handled under the PCSD service contract.
 - South Sound 911 Dispatch and Report Service Contract
 - We are still fine tuning the new radios, radio dispatch, computers in the cars and report writing system, but it is working well to date and we are now tied into the region, both with radios and reports.

Training

- For 2015, the officers will participate and receive their 60 hours of on-going training with the Pierce County Sheriff's Department Training Unit, who provides regional certified training at no cost to their regional partners.
 - Includes 40 hours of in service training {legal updates, emergency vehicle operation, defensive tactics, active shooter and advanced patrol tactics, first aid to include the AED and other necessary topics}.
 - Includes twenty hours of firearms, tactics and lethal force training {2 ten hour training days, one summer and one winter}
 - This training criteria, topics and amount of hours exceeds the standards set by the industry and meets the professional training best practices.

Management Activities

- The review of the current Policies and Procedures Manual is continuous.
- The 2015 Budget is operational.
- The 2015 Department Training Plan is operational.
- The Town Emergency Management Plan and Hazard Mitigation Plan is being revisited and updated in cooperation with Eatonville Fire and Emergency Management.

Significant Cases

- 15-161-0040: Heroin overdose by a Town resident. Transported to the hospital.
- 15-181-0964: One business burglary to Bertoglios Pizza and another to the Landmark Restaurant, both occurring in the late evening of 06-29-2015 or early morning of 06-30-2015.
 - Three of our local juveniles (all live in Town) were arrested and booked into Remann Hall Juvenile Detention Center by Eatonville Police.
- 15-185-0378: Business burglary at Eatonville Middle School and a residential burglary near the airport. One local adult male (in Town resident) arrested and booked into the Pierce County Jail for burglary (while armed) and felony malicious mischief (damage over \$1500).
 - This occurred just prior to the July 4 Parade and because of PCSD Service Contract, we were able to investigate the burglaries while also supporting the Parade.
